Dear Friends,

As Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) wraps up our 50th anniversary commemorations, we continue to be reminded of why we came into existence and why we are still here. For fifty years, VVAW has had continuing priorities: *agitating* to end our war and stop wars like it; *fighting* for decent benefits, including VA medical care, treatment for Agent Orange, PTSD and a decent GI Bill; and *teaching* the public about what we experienced - trying to make sense out of the senselessness of our war - and how to be on guard against future wars. VVAW has continued those priorities since our earliest days. **Please consider supporting VVAW and our legacy with a tax-deductible end-of-the-year contribution.**

In the early 1970s, while the war was still being fought, VVAW members traveled to northern Vietnam as part of peace delegations. Barry Romo, who served in combat during the 1968 Tet Offensive, joined peace activist Joan Baez and former Nuremberg Prosecutor Telford Taylor on a trip to Hanoi in December 1972, during the so-called "Christmas bombing." They witnessed firsthand the destruction of schools and hospitals. Barry returned to the US to speak publicly about these acts and to give witness to the atrocities being committed against the Vietnamese people. We fought against the onslaught of revisionist history in the 80s when Reagan was describing Vietnam as an "honorable war." With mainstream movies that challenged the official narrative about the war, we found new interest in VVAW and its history. There was a clear rise in discussions about the role VVAW played during the war. This has continued well into the current era.

Now, 50 years later, while there are many who view the Vietnam war as ancient history and know little about it. There are also those who thought they knew what the war was about who are now challenged by the new documentary series by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick for PBS, "The Vietnam War." The documentary was by no means all-inclusive. The documentary left unanswered questions, left out important details, and reiterated some of the usual myths. While the documentary can be criticized and nit-picked, we in VVAW should see this as a tool to continue our efforts at organizing for veterans and their families who still suffer as well as fighting for ALL victims of Agent Orange exposure, in the US and in Vietnam. There is still much healing to be done, and a huge part of that healing is recognition of the central responsibility of the US government and successive policymakers in the American war against Vietnam and its people.

This is why VVAW is just as important today as we have been for the last 50 years. VVAW was the first veteran's group organized to oppose its war while it was still happening. VVAW is the only anti-war veteran's organization still around from the time of our war. We still publish the very finest anti-war Veterans newspaper, *The Veteran*, twice a year. Our website, [vvaw.org](http://www.vvaw.org), has a collection of EVERY VVAW newspaper, since the beginning. Our FaceBook site (<https://www.facebook.com/groups/vvawinc>) is active with relevant news and discussion.

We lost many of our brothers and sisters along the way. Many died from direct after-effects of the war, like Agent Orange exposure and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), others from the perils of being in the working class and some from getting older. **But, we are still here and our role is just as important as ever.**

**There is still time to participate in VVAW's 50th anniversary commemorations.** Check out our latest publication, "VVAW: 50 Years of Struggle."
