As early as 1973, VVAW turned its attention to the Veterans Administration (VA). At actions in Milwaukee and Chicago, VVAW members occupied their local VAs and demanded decent benefits for all vets, a single-type discharge for all vets, and universal and unconditional amnesty, among other demands. These actions intensified as VVAW made the Fight on the VA a national campaign. "Decent health care is our right: we're sick and tired and ready to fight."

The continued influx of new veterans from the US' never-ending wars of aggression, along with the aging of our generation, and our continued health problems, has proven the need for the VA now, more than ever. "One of the main reasons the Koch brothers and other ultra conservatives are pushing the narrative that the VA is broken beyond repair is that they want to promote the idea that government can do no good and that the private sector can do no harm. They are adamantly opposed to any government programs and deeply opposed to expansion of government services. They are almost apoplectic about the prospect of any kind of publicly funded, national health program (known as single payer) in the US. They devote millions to amplify any problems that occur in the VA and use even small problems to try to convince Americans that a rational tax-supported national health system would be a disaster. The VA is proof positive that publicly funded healthcare works and works really well.
